PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE

M ost of us can recall the words of the Sunday school song that begins – "this little light of mine, I'm going to let it shine."

> The second verse suggests that the light might be hidden under a bushel, and vou may recall the thrill it was as a child to shout an earth-shaking "NO" at just the right time. Shouting was normally discouraged in church, but the mere thought of hiding that light under a bushel provided an exception to the shouting rule that we all clearly enjoved.

This simple children's song, derived from the Sermon on the Mount, carries a powerful message. These are the words of Christ who compelled his followers to become the light of the world. He called us all to walk in that light just as he is in that light. Compared to the little imaginary candlelight we made with our index finger, lighting the world seems like an extremely tall order.

In actuality, it is not we

whom he calls to shine, but it is his light, the light of Christ that must burn brightly through us. If darkness, despair and fear are to be conquered in our world, it will be through reflections of him and those who light the world as messengers of hope.

The same gospel passage refers to a city on a hill whose light cannot be hidden. Much like the illumined life Christ has called each of us to live, he has also established beacons on hilltops, consecrated places like Southern Wesleyan that exist to burn brightly and ignite hearts with the presence of God as his witnesses to the world.

Southern Wesleyan's mission is to engage each new generation and ignite that passion and fire in their hearts as beacons of light in a world many of us will never see. Much like an eternal flame, our university remains fully committed to educate and equip men and women so that they will burn brightly and give witness to God's presence in their own lives.

Shall that light ever be hidden under a bushel? Shall the light of the good news of Christ ever be compromised or diminished in this place? Much like our answer to that childhood song, may we shout our response in unison, loudly, and with renewed passion:

NO! A thousand times no! We are going to let it shine.






'Care of Creation' features Southern Wesleyan authors

A group of Southern Wesleyan University employees contributed chapters to a new book that offers a biblical perspective on humanity's stewardship of the earth and its inhabitants.

The new book, "Care of Creation: Christian Voices on God, Humanity, and the Environment," was recently released by Wesleyan Publishing House.

The book's contributing authors include Dr. Christina Accornero, chair of the religion division and associate professor of religion; Dr. Don Wood, professor of religion; Dr. Martin LaBar, professor emeritus of science; Dr. Rocky Nation, professor of biology; Dr. Susan Rouse, professor of biology; and Rev. Ken Dill, associate vice president for spiritual life and university chaplain. Dr. Roger McKenzie, professor of religion, assisted in the planning and coordination of the book.



The book, edited by Joseph Coleson, professor of Old Testament at Nazarene Theological Seminary and an ordained minister in The Wesleyan Church, includes contributions from faculty at other Wesleyan institutions, as well as from Dr. Jo Anne Lyon, general superintendent of The Wesleyan Church.

"Creation isn't all about people, but it's about the environment – everything that walks on earth and flies – it's the total package," Accornero said. "It's a clear connection that we are created beings who are able to care for the environment as a whole. To ignore that assignment from God would be to fall down on our stewardship."

Chapters authored by Southern Wesleyan faculty and staff include "Choices between Life and Death," by Accornero and Rouse; "Land and Water Conservation," by Nation and Dill; and "Endangered Species and Habitats," by LaBar and Wood.

"Our job is a ministry where we can help students achieve educational goals and model Christianity to our students," Blackwell said. "We are service-oriented. We look mainly at how we can serve and minister to each student who applies to the university. We try to keep Godfocused and look for what's best for each applicant."

Blackwell has held the regional director position for the past year, and is pleased to combine his passion for education with Southern Wesleyan University's Christian perspective.

> "I love education. I love the opportunity for any age group to be able to learn. And the Christian perspective really attracted me," he said.

Students attend accelerated classes that are designed to fit into the lives of busy working adults.

"Our adult students are special because they're juggling work, family and all their outside responsibilities along with their education," Blackwell said. "Our classes meet one night a week and we set a schedule for them way in advance so they can plan their schedules. We help them with the paperwork to apply. We take our students by the hand and walk them through the process."

Blackwell earned his bachelor's degree in history at Limestone College and his master's degree in education from Converse College. He has held a variety of teaching and administrative roles during his 38-year career. Blackwell tried retirement for six months and, after redesigning his yard, installing a swimming pool and revamping his landscaping, he was ready to head back to work.

"As long as I'm able to contribute, I want to work," Blackwell said. "I love working with people and seeing the lightbulb go off for students as they achieve."

As adult students, many have been away from the classroom setting for a number of years and are nervous about their ability to succeed, Blackwell said.

"I love seeing students who have been out of school for years come back and make that leap of faith – it's a traumatic experience for some who have been out of school for years. I love the look on their face as they find success," Blackwell said. "We are proud to see their accomplishments and to celebrate that they can do it. God helps those who help themselves and we want them to do well."

Southern Wesleyan's classes are taught by professors who have workplace experience in their fields. Although the coursework isn't easy, professors are eager to help students achieve, Blackwell said.

"The coursework is very rigorous. It's not easy. It does require a lot of work. When students go through our program, they've not only passed all the courses, they have learned a lot. I think that's why we see those smiles and satisfaction from those who achieve," Blackwell said. "But our format is designed for the working adult. They can get a quality education in a Christian atmosphere. It's very doable."

Southern Wesleyan University is more than 100 years old and headquartered in Central, S.C. The university has offered classes at the Greenville location for the past 24 years. Southern Wesleyan is different from other colleges and universities that offer education for adults, often with an online format.

"There are a lot of storefront institutions, where you can pay your money and get a degree," Blackwell said. "I think we offer a quality education that allows students to implement what they learn here in their workplaces. Our face-to-face instructors have experience in the workplace. That makes us different from our competitors."

With current economic difficulties, now is a great time for people to add to their education and give themselves an edge in the job market.

"With the economy the way it is, people need a degree or a higher degree to advance in the workplace," Blackwell said. "What we're seeing is applicants who see the need for that bachelor's or master's degree. It makes them

more employable. Teachers who obtain a master's in education will get a pay raise and it makes them more employable as well."

Southern Wesleyan's Greenville location is close to interstates 85 and 385. The university is at 84 Villa Road, off Pelham Road, near Haywood Road. It is easy to spot from Interstate 385.

"We're centrally located in Greenville County. We're easy to get to, logistically, and we've been in the same location for a number of years," Blackwell said.

In addition to education and his faith, Blackwell also has a passion for water skiing and horseback riding. A few years back, Blackwell was a competitive water skier, who could ski barefoot and even ski on a boat paddle. Also, Blackwell's family raised Tennessee Walking Horses, which led him to a job breaking horses during his high school and college years. Today, Blackwell and his wife, Pattie, have four grandsons and a new granddaughter. The Blackwells attend Lyman United Methodist Church.

"I enjoy being with family," Blackwell said. "My wife is my best friend."

And Blackwell also enjoys a family atmosphere at Southern Wesleyan University.

"Southern Wesleyan University is a rewarding place to work," Blackwell said. "I don't feel like I'm coming to work. We do a devotion here most mornings – it starts our day on the right track. We're like a family here at the Greenville location."

Davis began his coaching career in 2001 at the high school ranks as the head varsity boy's coach at The King's Academy in Jonesboro, Ind. During his six years (20022008) with the men's program at Wesley, the Wolverines advanced to their first-ever conference title game at that time in 2005-2006, and had double-digit wins for three consecutive years from 2005-2008 for the first time in the Division III era with the men's program.

"I am looking forward to the direction that John will take the women's basketball program," Williams said. "I know he will provide solid leadership and I am sure he is excited to begin his head coaching career here at SWU."

Davis finished his undergraduate degree from Indiana Wesleyan University in 2002, and graduated with his MBA from Wesley College
