### University announces Dr. Voss as new president

Southern Weslevan University's board of trustees unanimously voted to approve Dr. Todd Voss to become the 18th president of the institution.

Dr. Voss will take office on July 1, according to university board chairman Dr. Charles Joiner, who also led the presidential search committee.

"We are very pleased with this result," Joiner said of the search committee's work. "I can assure you that the process was undertaken in a very prayerful way."

Joiner characterized Voss as exacting, energetic, charismatic and a proven leader.

"Dr. Voss brings excellent experience in Christian higher education to us," Joiner said. "We're pleased to have him join our team.'

Voss addressed the university community at a press conference on May 27, fielding questions and outlining some of his plans for Southern Wesleyan University. He expressed gratitude to retiring president Dr. David Spittal for positioning the university for success and prosperity.

"Dr. Spittal has had 17 years of amazing success here," Voss said. "It is a very promising future. I am excited about that."

Voss said he believes that a university president's role is to cast a vision and provide enthusiasm and drive for a university.

"This place is ready to go. God really wants this place to be a place of excellence," he said.

Some specific areas Voss said he plans to focus on include possible renovations or improvements to student housing on the university's campus in Central and the possibilities of a new recreation and wellness complex, as well as a new science building.

"We're about mind, body and spirit," Voss said.

Voss also said he is interested in exploring more use of online classes and the possibility of adding Southern Wesleyan University locations in nearby states. Currently, the university offers classes at its main campus in Central, S.C., as well as Greenville, Spartanburg, Greenwood, Columbia, North Augusta and Charleston.

Characterizing Southern Wesleyan University as "unapologetically Christian," Voss said the university

seeks to nurture the minds as well as the spirits and the hearts of its students, with an emphasis on faith, character and integrity.

"It's not about recruiting every student. It's about recruiting students who are looking for this experience," Voss said. "We have a lot to offer."

Voss has been serving as executive vice president at Indiana Wesleyan University. His areas of leadership include student life, spiritual life, information technology, athletics, operations, construction, campus planning and other related functions.

He began working at IWU in 1989 as vice president for student development with previous experience in student life, business affairs, auxiliary services and campus planning from West Virginia University, Western Michigan University and Michigan State.

Voss has been on the forefront of IWU growing from a small campus to one of the largest institutions in the Council of Christian Colleges and Universities, with almost 16,000 students enrolled.

He created the Center for Life Calling and Leadership, designed a holistic residence life and student development ministry that has become a strong model for other Christian colleges, developed collaborative on-campus student internship sites and has built solid systems to encourage a robust sense of community and spiritual life on the IWU campus.

He earned his bachelor's degree in pre-medicine/psychology, his master's in counseling and his doctorate in counseling/higher education administration.

Voss and his wife, Julie, have two married children, Emily and Matthew, and one grandchild, Luke.

A strong believer in developing close ties with the community, Voss said he and his wife are impressed with the friendliness of the community members they have met.

"The warmth of Central and the people of this area – wow! They are so welcoming," Voss said.

# Mark your calendar: P.B. Wood golf tournament


Golf, food, prizes, fellowship and fun all while supporting a great cause.

## University hosts sports awards night

The Southern Wesleyan University Department of Athletics held its fifth Annual SWUPY Awards on the campus of SWU at Newton-Hobson Chapel and Fine Arts Center. The event is the annual athletics awards banquet that honors the student-athletes that competed for SWU in the 2010-2011 seasons.

The theme for the night was SWUPYSCENTER and the anchors for the show were Director of Athletics Chris Williams and Head Baseball Coach Mike Gillespie. Members of the SWU coaching staff made ESPN-themed commercials, which were shown on the many T.V. monitors on the stage and on two large projection screens. The show also included a segment talking about SWU President Dr. David Spittal's upcoming retirement, SWU winning the Lil' Bronze Peach for the second consecutive year, and other national sporting event topics.

The highlight of the night was the induction of Spittal into the Athletics Hall of Fame. Spittal was also presented with two national championship rings from the 2007 season when baseball and women's basketball took home the National Christian College Athletic Association National Titles.

Parents, faculty and staff, members of the board of trustees, and community supporters from the Central and Clemson areas were all in attendance to witness this event. Each team had two representatives who were presenters of specific awards that were handed out throughout the night, along with other special guests and faculty and staff members. The winners were voted on by coaches and students, along with faculty and staff of the SWU community.

Stephen Tolan (men's soccer) and Jackie Tubb (women's soccer) were named Mr. and Ms. Warrior, while Nick Lagroone (men's basketball) and Erica Segars (women's cross country) were named the Male and Female Athlete of the Year. Segars also took home the Female Performance of the Year, and Michael Corpening (men's basketball) received the Male Performance of the Year.

The Dr. C. Keith Connor Warrior Spirit Award was given to the voice of the Warriors, Phil Pranger, who does all the announcing at all home events for the SWU teams. John Collins, Student Government Association president, was awarded the Fan of the Year with the women's basketball team being voted the Team of the Year. Head women's basketball coach John Davis was named the Coach of the Year. The volleyball team won the team academic award for highest GPA, while Lauren Droddy (women's cross

country) and Nick Hindes (men's cross country) were awarded the Female and Male Scholar-Athletes.

Allison Droddy (women's cross country/softball) and Emmanuel Forbes (men's soccer) were named the Female and Male Newcomer of the Year. The men's basketball team took home the honor of Game of the Year for their 87-81 win over Emmanuel College on Feb. 19 in historic Tysinger Gymnasium. Carlos Gonzalez (men's soccer) took home the Courage Award.



#### **SWU claims Lil' Bronze Peach**

Southern Wesleyan University claimed their second consecutive Lil'Bronze Peach, winning the 2010-2011 series by a final margin of 20.5 to 8 against Emmanuel College. The series began between the two schools in 2009-2010, with SWU winning the inaugural trophy.

The idea of the trophy being the Lil' Bronze Peach is based on the large amount of peaches that are produced in both South Carolina and Georgia. The annual competition includes all sports which both schools sponsor – baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's soccer and softball. Points are awarded for regular season games only and the breakdown is as follows: baseball – 1.5 points per game (3 games), men's basketball – 2 points per game (2 games), women's basketball – 2 points per game (2 games), men's soccer – 4 points per game (1 game), women's soccer – 4 points per game (1 game), softball – 1 point per game (4 games).

In addition to the competition on the field, the school which has a higher percentage of their student-athletes on the SSAC All-Academic Team receives four points. The total number of points that can be awarded each school year is 28.5.

#### Student-athletes receive SSAC honors

Southern Wesleyan University and the Southern States Athletic Conference has awarded Jackie Tubb of the women's soccer team and Stephen Tolan of the men's soccer team the Honor Student-Athlete Awards sponsored by Musco Lighting.

Tubb, a senior from Athens, Ala., finished her star-studded career at SWU being named 2nd Team All-Conference in 2007 and 2008, and was a SSAC All-Academic in 2009 and 2010. She scored 36 goals and had 11 assists in her 74game career at SWU helping lead the Warriors to a 42-32-4 record during her four years, and also leading the team to a berth in the 2008 NCCAA National Women's Soccer Tournament. Tubb was named the NCCAA South Region Player of the Year in 2008.

In the classroom, Tubb has a 3.81 GPA, and worked as work-study for the SWU campus bed and breakfast, Eagle's Rest, for four years, while serving as a student ambassador from 2008-2011. In the summer of 2010, she served as resident assistant. She was also on the dean's list from 2007-2010, in the SWU Honors Program in 2007 and won a SWU Honors Scholarship Award in 2009.

In her spare time away from the pitch, Tubb was involved with IGNITE for all four years and started the Waste for Taste program at SWU. Waste for Taste is a program that was coordinated with the dining hall on SWU's campus and used the extra meals that students did not use on their meal cards, and put together those extra meals for the homeless in the surrounding area. She is also a radio show host on 93.7 FM every Saturday from 9 a.m. – noon.

"Iackie touched the lives of many individuals on Southern Wesleyan's campus, including my own," commented SWU head women's soccer coach Tom Price. "She represented the university, the athletic program, herself and most importantly, Christ, in an amazing way. She will be greatly missed."

Tolan, a senior from Central, S.C., played in 62 games in his SWU career, scoring 13 goals and adding 5 assists. He finished his four-year career at 33-33-9, and he was also named to the Musco Lighting Champion of Character

Team in 2010. He has a 3.85 GPA in the classroom. During his time off the field, Tolan was involved in IGNITE and did volunteer work throughout the Central and Clemson areas. He is the junior varsity head boy's soccer coach and is also involved in youth ministry in the local church.

"Stephen is a dream kid for any one to have on their team," said SWU head men's soccer coach Camilo Rodriguez. "He has been a great student in the classroom, a great player and a strong Christian, along with having a strong work ethic in all he does. He is an example for all of his teammates and

### **SWU** hires new softball coach

Southern Wesleyan University recently hired Anna Ball as the next head softball coach for the Warriors.



This is Ball's first head coaching position after serving as the assistant coach at Notre Dame College for two years, after a star-studded playing career.

"The support of the SWU community will be a vital asset to our program as we move forward in building a stable program. I am humbled to be given the opportunity to develop studentathletes through Christ by way of softball," Ball said.

Ball helped lead the team as a player to a 5th place finish in the NAIA National Tournament in 2009, and another appearance into the NAIA National Tournament as an assistant coach in 2010.

Ball is currently the NAIA career leader in batting average (.516) and leader in slugging percentage (.862), while ranking 2nd in the NAIA in doubles with 87. She was named to the NAIA National Tournament Team in 2009, was the American Mideast Conference Player of the Year, 1st Team All-Conference, and was a NAIA Academic All-American in 2009. Ball was a NAIA 1st Team All-American in 2008 and a 2nd Team All-American in 2007. She currently owns seven records at NDC and was awarded the NDC President's Award for outstanding student-athlete achievement.

"I am highly impressed with her leadership and relationship building skills," SWU Athletic Director Chris Williams said. "Anna will work hard to build relationships with her student-athletes while expecting 100 percent effort from them as well. She will bring passion, energy and high expectations to a young roster of Warrior softball players."

Thank you for partnering together with us at SWU and with God, as we team up for the coming year 2011-2012, to help see great things happen at SWU.


