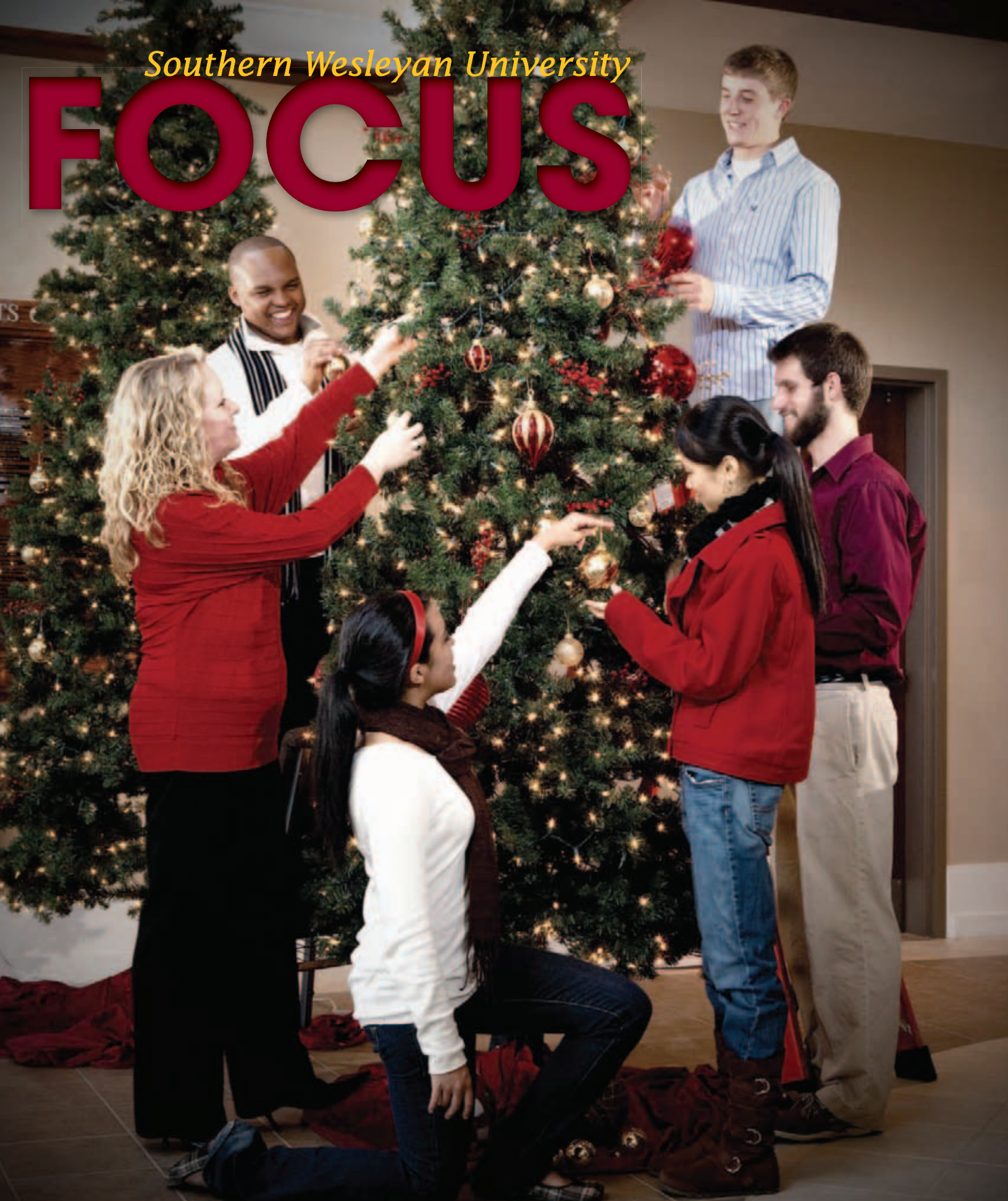

Yellow Ribbon scholarship available for military

Southern Wesleyan University is saluting military veterans by offering free university tuition and fees.

"We appreciate the sacrifice made by veterans and their families and are pleased to extend greater access to our university through programs designed to provide financial assistance at an unprecedented level," said Dr. David Spittal, university president. "Those who have devoted themselves to our safety and protection deserve an opportunity to pursue their educational goals."

The university is proud to demonstrate its thanks to the nation's veterans by taking part in the Yellow Ribbon program. All veterans eligible for the program (as determined by the U.S. Department of Veterans' Affairs) will receive a Yellow Ribbon

scholarship. That scholarship, together with matching funds from the VA, covers all tuition and fees at Southern Wesleyan University that are not covered by Post 9/11 GI Bill benefits.

"We want to express our genuine gratitude for those who have selflessly served our country," said Donna Pittman, VA specialist at Southern Wesleyan University. "We are so pleased to offer a tuition discount to active duty military, National Guard and Reserve members. The university also provides a tuition discount for the spouses of those who are on active duty in the military."

University discounts are available on both undergraduate and graduate programs.

Southern Wesleyan University's participation in the Yellow Ribbon

program is determined annually. Should Southern Wesleyan University cease participation in the Yellow Ribbon program, eligible veterans will continue to receive other benefits under the Post 9/11 GI Bill.

SWU installs electron transmission microscope

Southern Wesleyan University's science students now have a powerful research tool, thanks to the recent donation of a Hitachi transmission electron microscope.

The microscope, donated by the Life Sciences Department at Clemson University, represents a significant piece of highly technical equipment that will be a powerful and invaluable addition to SWU's science, pre-med and forensics students, according to Dr. David Spittal, university president. Approximately \$25,000 was raised through donations of colleagues and friends of Southern Wesleyan University to pay for moving and installing the microscope.

"We are deeply appreciative of their support and a donation from Hitachi Corporation for making this equipment possible," Spittal said.

Dr. Walt Sinnamon, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at SWU, noted that Hitachi cut the

cost to dismantle and reassemble the microscope essentially in half.

"The transmission electron microscope will allow us to view biological samples and physical samples up to as much as 600,000 magnification, if needed," Sinnamon said. "This will be a real

asset, particularly in the cellular and molecular biological areas."

The donation also means that the department now houses two electron microscopes. Sinnamon said that Clemson donated a JEOL scanning electron microscope 10 years ago.

University enrollment climbs with fall semester

Enrollment at Southern Wesleyan University continues to grow as the number of traditional students enrolled at SWU for fall reaches a record high.

The university's traditional student enrollment for the fall semester reached 685 with full time enrollment at 8.4 percent higher this year than it was last year, according to Dr. David Spittal, SWU president. Total Southern Wesleyan University enrollment reached 2,364 full time students for fall 2009.

"We are pleased with the enrollment growth that has occurred despite significant economic pressures on students and their families," Spittal said. "The university has provided students with record levels of scholarships and financial aid that have provided additional support and a significant impact on enrollment."

Enrollment in Southern Wesleyan University's Adult and Graduate Studies programs continues to hold steady, despite widespread

economic uncertainty. The university offers classes across South Carolina, at sites in Greenville, Columbia, Charleston and North Augusta, as well as Greenwood and Spartanburg.

"These are days of significant change in our world, but we are reminded that God still provides for the needs of the university and its students. We believe that God has plans for the rising generation." Spittal said. "We are thankful for tangible evidence of His continued blessings through this record enrollment."



Charleston student loves Christian,

Beverly Gaillard is full of love.

She loves God, her family, her church and her coworkers at the Medical University of South Carolina in Charleston. And she loves Southern Wesleyan University.

“The Christian atmosphere is here at Southern Wesleyan. I love that,” she said. “I love that with each class, the chaplain comes in and prays with us and the instructors lead the classes in devotions. I think it’s very important to be surrounded by Christians. That’s one thing I love about this school.”

Gaillard is earning a bachelor’s degree in management at the Charleston location of Southern Wesleyan University, in Faber Place, off U.S. Highway 526.

A graduate of Wando High School, Gaillard was born and reared in Mt. Pleasant, S.C. Rather than pursuing college, she focused on her career and her children. Today, she has two children and four grandchildren.

Gaillard is supervisor of patient registration in the ambulatory surgery department and the radiology department at the Medical University of South Carolina in downtown Charleston. She has worked there 17 years, beginning

as a registration person and working her way up to supervisor.

She loves the staff she works with at MUSC.

“I have some really good people that I work with – very dedicated women,” Gaillard said. “I love my job. And it gave me a way to come to school, with the tuition assistance program at work.”

Her university courses so far have helped her at work, she said. She uses management and leadership skills to help her staff, and she has polished her writing skills.

“I feel more comfortable now when I’m speaking to my director. I feel like I have more to offer,” she said. “I’m hoping that I will get the opportunity to advance to an even higher position.”

Gaillard is considering seeking a master’s degree in health administration after she completes her degree at Southern Wesleyan University. But it wasn’t career advancement alone that drove her into the classroom after a 30-year break, she said.

“It was more of a personal thing. I just wanted to be able to say that I’ve accomplished this goal that I’ve always wanted,” Gaillard said of her degree.

“When I was in high school, I was always a very good student – graduated with honors. But there was a 30-year lapse. I was wondering how well I was going to be able to do,” she said.

“It’s actually been great. The professors have been really good to make sure we accomplish the goals. Working in the study groups has been good because you have other people to give feedback. You have them as another resource to help you. It’s been a wonderful opportunity. I’m really glad I did it.”

The professors at Southern Wesleyan University were helpful and willing to give extra help after class or outside of class hours, she said. Her favorite classes were Bible classes and she appreciates the friendliness of the Southern Wesleyan University staff, as well as the bonds she has formed with her classmates.

"I definitely found many friends from being here – people that I will remember forever. Southern Wesleyan University gives you that atmosphere," she said.

When she's not studying, working or spending time with her family, Gaillard is active in her church. She is an ordained deacon, superintendent of her Sunday school and a singer in their praise and worship team.

The convenience of Southern Wesleyan University's classes made all the difference for Gaillard. She lives in North Charleston and works in downtown Charleston, so it's very easy for her to attend classes at Southern Wesleyan University's Charleston location. It takes about 10 minutes to reach the university from downtown, she said.

"The one night of class and one night of study group works well for me," Gaillard said. "I could not have done it if classes were four times a week."

One goal that Gaillard has already achieved is writing a book. She is the author of "It is So – Fulfilling your God Given Destiny," a book of encouragement designed to inspire readers based on God's promises.

"It's about getting to a place with God that you feel like you really have a purpose and a destiny in God," she said. "That has been a dream of mine forever – being an author. It's so exciting to be able to say I've fulfilled that goal."

The courses at Southern Wesleyan University aren't easy, but they're not

impossible if you're willing to work hard, she said.

"I think SWU is very competitive with any other school out there. I know when I'm done here, I'll have a degree that I can use," Gaillard said.

"If I can do it after all this time, then I think anyone can do it, but you have to be determined and you can't allow anything to hinder you," she said. "If you trust in God and don't allow anything to stop you, anything's possible."

NAIA honors SWU Warriors

Southern Wesleyan University has been named to the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics list of Champions of Character institutions for the 2008-09 school year.

A total of 231 colleges and universities were named to the list. The mission of Champions of Character is to restore character values and raise a generation of students who understand and demonstrate in everyday decisions integrity, respect, responsibility, sportsmanship and servant leadership.

The NAIA and member institutions use the Champions of Character program to instill an understanding of character values in sports, and provide student-athletes, coaches and parents the training to help them know and do the right things, inside and outside the sports setting. The program is dedicated to the principle that character is a choice and that being a champion is not just about winning, but making good decisions consistently in daily life.

To be considered a Champions of Character institution, schools must complete a form which is later reviewed by a team directed by NAIA Vice President of Champions of Character Rob Haworth. These schools incorporate the five core values in the campus community and educate student-athletes, coaches, parents and fans on specific standards and expectations.

"The Champions of Character program supports performance-driven athletics while defining expectations and standards that drive successful teams and athletic departments," said Haworth. "I congratulate these fine institutions and thank the administrators, coaches and student-athletes for playing a role in advancing character-driven intercollegiate athletics."

SWU competes for Lil' Bronze Peach

Southern Wesleyan University's Warriors are facing a challenge from nearby rival Emmanuel College for a new award – the Lil' Bronze Peach.

Southern Wesleyan University Director of Athletics Chris Williams, along with Emmanuel College Director of Athletics Mike Bona, is pleased to announce the creation of the Lil' Bronze Peach competition between the two schools.

Emmanuel College in Franklin Springs, Ga., has much in common with Southern Wesleyan University, including affiliations with the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, Southern States Athletic Conference and the National Christian College Athletic Association. Both schools are Christian based colleges and are located just 50 miles from each other.

The idea of the trophy being the Lil' Bronze Peach is based on the large amount of peaches that are produced in both South Carolina and Georgia. The annual competition will include all sports which both schools sponsor, including baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's soccer, and softball.

The trophy will be presented at the winning school's final chapel service with the losing director of athletics presenting the award to the winning director of athletics.

Student-athletes and coaches at Southern Wesleyan University gathered for Champions with Christ, an annual event which kicks off the new school year for the athletic department.

SWU Director of Athletics Chris Williams shared his vision for "SWU Blue Wednesdays" in which everyone affiliated with Southern Wesleyan University is encouraged to wear royal blue on Wednesdays to show their support for the university.

Williams then introduced Herb Tyler, who currently owns Chick-fil-A stores in Clemson, S.C., and Seneca, S.C., as the featured speaker of the evening. Tyler referred to the theme verse for the SWU Athletic Department which is Romans 12:5: "So in Christ we who are in Christ form one body, and each member belongs to all of the others."

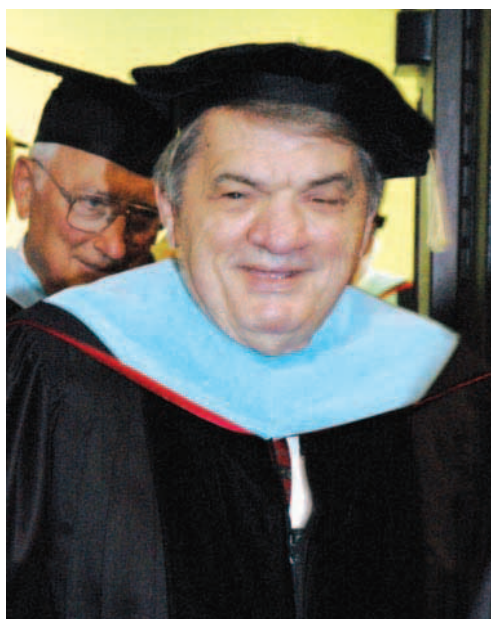
University mourns loss of retired professor

Retired Southern Wesleyan University professor Dr. Bob McDonald died Oct. 24 after a courageous battle with cancer.

McDonald served as associate director of LEAP (now known as Adult and Graduate Studies) 1988-1997. Prior to this, he served as an adjunct instructor in the LEAP program from 1986-1988. In 1998, McDonald assumed full-time responsibilities as professor of recreation and social sciences and was appointed as Division Chair of Social Sciences in 1999, a position he held until his retirement in 2005.

McDonald was selected to address the graduating class of December 2004 and was awarded a presidential citation from the university. In May 2005, he was awarded status as faculty emeritus.

Dr. David Spittal, president of Southern Wesleyan University, praised McDonald as a highly esteemed member of the SWU faculty who contributed greatly to the advancement of the recreation program as well as his leadership within the Adult and Graduate Studies program.

"He was an active advocate for students and gave his time and interest to give support to all who came in contact with him," Spittal said.

Rev. Ken Dill, Southern Wesleyan University chaplain, was hired by McDonald to serve as director of student services in the AGS program. Dill described McDonald as a gracious man who taught him valuable lessons about managing people.

"Sometimes busy people are not productive people, but Bob was busy and productive. He also had the ability to make you feel like he had all the time in the world for you. A student would never know how busy he was because Bob never showed it," said Dill.

Dr. Don Wood, professor of religion, said "hero" is a word that best described McDonald. Wood said that McDonald's development of the recreation major was a boon to the university's enrollment. McDonald also would work late hours to help his majors get placed in internships and jobs. Wood added that McDonald was dedicated to his church family as well, faithfully teaching Sunday school and being active in ministry to his community.

"Though he was gentle and self-effacing, he also stood firmly for what he believed was just and right," Wood said.

Funeral services were held for McDonald Oct. 27 at First Baptist Church in Pickens, S.C.

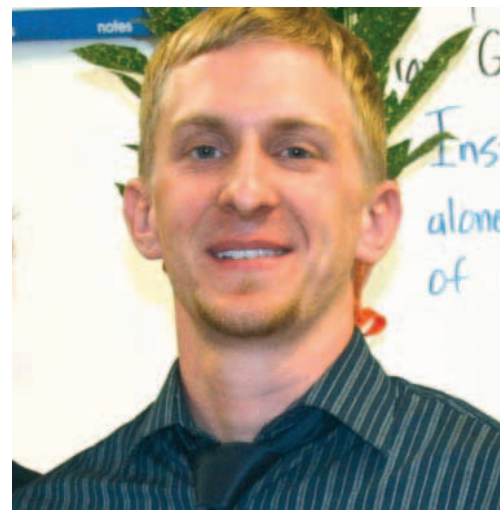

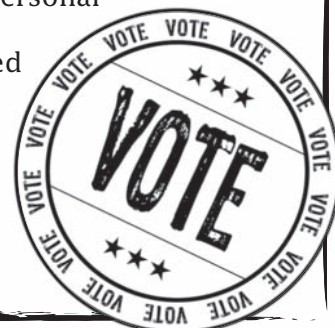
